

# AWARDS AND RECOGNITION

The City is considered a Triple Crown organization by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). Triple Crown organizations receive:

- Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR)
- Distinguished Budget Presentation Award
- Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) Award

These awards recognize the efforts and dedication to financial transparency and effective communication of financial information.

The City of Crystal Lake has a rich history, rewarding quality of life and tremendous community spirit. Crystal Lake has been a major economic engine in Northeastern Illinois for the past decade. The City offers residents and businesses high-quality services at one of the lowest municipal tax rates in the area.

## **Strong Economic Environment**

The City of Crystal Lake enjoys a stable economic environment. With wise financial stewardship and long-term planning, the City has preserved a healthy fund balance while delivering high quality services to the community. The largest single source of City revenue is sales tax, which reflects current economic trends and the attraction of new retail and restaurants.

According to the Melaniphy & Associates' 2024 Retail Sales Report, Crystal Lake was:

- #1 in McHenry County for Auto Sales with over \$312 million in sales.
- #1 in McHenry County for Drinking & Eating Establishments with over \$156 million in sales.

In addition to having the highest sales in McHenry County, Crystal Lake was also:

- 10th in the Chicagoland Area for Home Improvement Store Sales, with over \$112 million in sales.
- 12th in the Chicagoland Area for General Merchandise Sales, with over \$169 million in sales.
- Top 20 Suburban Communities for Drinking & Eating Establishments, with over \$156 million in sales.

### **Great Service at a Low Price**

The Crystal Lake City Council recently approved the 2024 Property Tax Levy, with an estimated 1.5 percent rate decrease. The City has been fortunate to add significant new property construction to the tax rolls, reducing the overall impact of the tax rate on property owners. The approved 2024 tax levy will supplement funding for the Fire Rescue Department and required pension obligations, as well as funding for school crossing guards. The property tax also includes the Crystal Lake Library's property tax levy.

When comparing surrounding communities that provide like services, Crystal Lake's portion of a property owner's tax bill is among the lowest. Since 1997, the City has not levied a property tax for the General Fund. As a result, only approximately 11% of the property tax bill is attributable to municipal services provided by the City of Crystal Lake (2023 Levy).

# HIGHLIGHTS

## Low Crime Rate

According to the Illinois State Police using crime reporting statistics, Crystal Lake has experienced an estimated 2.56% decrease in reported Group A Offenses from 2023 to 2024. NIBRS Group A offenses are made up of fifty-two (52) specific crimes including Crimes against Persons, Property and Society.

### Enhanced ISO Rating

ISO is the leading supplier of data and analytics for the property/casualty insurance industry.

# Fire Suppression

ISO ratings are based on the Public Protection Classification (PPC) survey that conducts an analysis of the structural fire suppression delivery system provided by the City.

The City's current ISO Rating is 2 out of 10, with the lower rating being better.

The City's Class 2 rating places the City within the top 5% of fire suppression services in the United States.

## **Building Code Effectiveness**

The City received a 4 out of 10 ISO rating for commercial and residential properties, above the average rating of 6 for Illinois communities.

In 2024, the City's residents and businesses benefited from the services listed below provided by the City of Crystal Lake:

### Community Development

Construction permit inspections completed: 14,508

### Public Works and Engineering

- Resurfaced approximately 8.9 lane miles of roadway and crack-sealed an additional 44.3 miles of roadway.
- Replaced 7,760 feet of curb, 3,850 feet of sidewalk and eliminated 1,105 sidewalk tripping hazards.
- · Supplied 1.32 billion gallons of fresh water.
- Treated 1.44 billion gallons of wastewater.
- Plowed 326 lane miles of roadway during each snow event.
- Cleaned 16.3 miles of sanitary sewer line, lined an additional 1.4 miles and acoustically tested 60.1 miles of sewer line.
- Planted 201 parkway trees and trimmed 4,920 parkway trees.

### Police

Responded to 26,142 calls.

### Fire Rescue

- Responded to 7,586 calls.
- Served 5,013 patients.
- Performed 490 plan reviews.
- · Performed 233 life safety and re-inspections.
- Public Education Events (total attendees): 16,441

### Three Oaks Recreation Area

- Over 270,000 vehicles entered the park in 2024.
- 84,908 guests visited the Swim Beach in 2024.
- Over 58 percent of park guests are from areas outside of Crystal Lake.







# Intergovernmental Cooperation



Intergovernmental cooperation takes many forms, including mutual aid agreements for police and fire services, intergovernmental service contracting, joint purchasing agreements, coordinated growth management planning, and regional provision of emergency services. One of the advantages of these types of arrangements is that they provide economies of scale and allow entities to do more with less.

The City has been a leader for years in intergovernmental cooperation. Some examples include:

# Southeast Emergency Communications (SEECOM)

The City was a founding member of SEECOM, a regional public safety dispatch center.

## Liability and Workers' Compensation Insurance Pool

The City is a participant in the Intergovernmental Risk Management Agency (IRMA), which allows municipal entities to band together for the purposes of reducing liability insurance costs.

### Contracted Fire Rescue Services

Through a fee agreement, the City provides fire rescue services to the Village of Lakewood and the Crystal Lake Rural Fire Protection District.

### Health Insurance Pool

The City is a participant in the Intergovernmental Personnel Benefit Cooperative (IPBC) which allows municipal groups to band together for the purposes of reducing health insurance costs.

## McHenry County Municipal Partnering Initiative (MPI)

The City is a member of the McHenry County MPI which is a purchasing collaboration of local governments in McHenry County. This is an initiative to reduce program costs through basic principles: bulk purchasing, the sharing of best practices, and the sharing of workloads. Any community could choose to opt out of a proposed project, maintaining the ability for communities to choose to do things their way while simultaneously allowing interested parties to cooperate and save on costs.

### Joint Purchasing Agreements

The City Council adopted a Procurement Ordinance which allows the City to take advantage of cooperative purchasing opportunities by becoming a member of various cooperative purchasing programs in addition to the State of Illinois Joint Purchase Program and the Suburban Purchasing Cooperative.







# Three Oaks Recreation Area



In 2024, Three Oaks Recreation Area continued to be a desirable recreational amenity. This is reflected in the continued high customer satisfaction ratings. The 2024 season saw an increase in park attendance, both in the number of vehicles that entered the park and guests who visited the beach. The park continued to be highly regarded by those who visit as a regional and national attraction.

### **Guest Satisfaction Remains a Priority**

- Per customer survey information, guests continued to be very satisfied with customer service provided by staff at the beach and marina.
- The number of repeat guests continues to remain high. Guests who
  visited the swim beach at least once a month increased in 2024. Over
  20% of guests surveyed rented a watercraft at least once per month.
- Approximately 92% of people who rented a boat were either very satisfied or satisfied with the quality of the boat and boat equipment.
- Approximately 96% of surveyed guests are either likely or very likely to return to the park. The other 4% are neutral with no responses reporting unlikely.
- Over 93% of people were very likely or likely to recommend Three Oaks Recreation Area to a friend or co-worker with no responses reporting unlikely.

### Attendance

- 84,908 guests visited the Swim Beach in 2024.
- Over 270,000 vehicles entered the park in 2024.
- Over 58 percent of park guests are from areas outside of Crystal Lake.

### Park Vendors

 The Quarry Cable Park, Board House, and Cottage on the Beach continued successful operations at the park in 2024.

## **Media Attention**

 Three Oaks Recreation Area ranked No. 1 on Trip Advisor's Top 20 Things to do in Crystal Lake.

### Revenues and Expenses

 Part-time staff expenses, which accounted for 56% of all park expenses, were completely paid for by park use revenues.



The City will begin construction on the renovation of Depot Park in Downtown Crystal Lake this year. The improvements will create a cohesive and enlarged park area for residents and visitors to enjoy. Enhancements include additional seating areas with multiple benches, tables with umbrellas,



bench swings, fountains, raised seating and a performance area.

Native plantings will accent the park and a community Christmas tree will round out the plantings with holiday cheer. A new entryway sign will honor the history of Crystal Lake's ice harvesting by being constructed of glass bricks. In addition, the script of the sign is a replica of the historic welcome sign that previously stood in Downtown Crystal Lake.

# Water's Edge Construction Continues

The construction of the mixed-use development is underway! Residents of the 240 apartment units have started to move-in and construction of the commercial lots is expected to commence in the spring. The public park areas are underway and will help connect Three Oaks Recreation Area to U.S. Route 14.



This exciting new development will energize the area and enhance the vibrancy of Crystal Lake's largest commercial corridor.

# Water's Edge


Water's Edge, Crystal Lake's newest and largest redevelopment project, is currently underway. This mixed-use development will offer 240 garden apartments and 20 luxury townhomes alongside amenities like a pool, sand volleyball, basketball, pickleball and a clubhouse. The new development is being led by Heartland Real Estate Partners and will bridge the natural beauty of Three Oaks Recreation Area with the vibrancy of the Northwest Highway key commercial corridor.

# Three Oaks Recreation Area Lake Loop Trail

- The lake loop trail will connect a 3.5 mile continuous path around the lake.
- The lake loop trail commenced construction in January 2025.
   Completion is anticipated in early 2026.
- The project is the number one requested amenity by guests since the park opened in 2010.



# **Dole Avenue Reconstruction**

- The \$6.7 million dollar project to reconstruct a 75-year-old roadway base was completed in the fall of 2024.
- New, larger water main to improve water flow, wider sidewalks, and bike lanes at the US Route 14 intersection were included in the project.



# Three Oaks Road/Sands Road/Lutter Drive Intersection Project

- Construction anticipated in the spring of 2025.
- Improvements include additional turn lanes and installation of traffic signals, as well as a multi-use path along the south side of Three Oaks Road.
- Over \$2.3 million in federal funding and developer contributions will help fund the improvements.



# Re-Establishment of Crystal Creek

- Includes removal of the storm sewer pipe installed in the 1950s. This portion of the creek will be re-established.
- Project will reduce flooding and improve water quality.
- Construction anticipated to start in the summer of 2025 and be complete in the summer of 2026.
- Approximately \$2 million in federal and state grant funding will help fund the improvements.

# Outreach



The City of Crystal Lake is committed to delivering information to the public that is clear and timely and promotes two-way communication between City officials and the Crystal Lake community.

The City publishes a monthly newsletter to provide residents with information about municipal programs, services, community events and actions of the City Council. In a continuing effort to keep residents informed about City news and events, residents can register to receive timely news about municipal services, City Council meetings, agendas, news releases, and more via e-mail.

Comcast provides the City with a 24-hour community access channel. Comcast subscribers can tune in to view information about community news and events.

The City's website at <a href="www.crystallake.org">www.crystallake.org</a> offers several interactive tools designed to help foster better communication and efficiency, including E-News, online bill pay and licensing, online permit and development applications through ezApp, the City's Transparency Portal, and the Form Center for requests or concerns.

Public documents are uploaded to the City's website to help provide greater access to information for residents, businesses and visitors. The City has a "Transparency Portal" page, a one-stop location that directs residents to details about City spending and operations, including current and past year budgets and audits, salary information for all City employees, and City Council and Committee Meeting agendas and minutes.

# Electronic Bidding

The City utilizes "QuestCDN", an electronic bidding notification and procurement system. QuestCDN enables suppliers and vendors to identify, respond to, and potentially win bid opportunities with the City of Crystal Lake.

The City issues competitive solicitations for goods and services using the QuestCDN Electronic Bidding System. Vendors are able to view, and when applicable, submit bids and proposal requirements electronically using the system. There is no charge to vendors to use the QuestCDN Electronic Bidding System, however vendors need to register. Vendors can also register through the City of Crystal Lake's website.

# Interactive Maps

In response to the demand for online access to a wealth of public information, the City has taken great strides in providing this information in easy to access maps via the City's online ESRI map. For residents seeking information about a particular property, the online map is an easy way to view an array of information on a specific property or the City overall. 
Pictured below, the decorative wood displayed behind the bar and above the fireplace is 100-year-old barnwood salvaged from a RedTail maintenance building.

Just outside of the building is a large patio with additional seating for dining, as well as four firepit areas to enjoy in the evenings.











# Water & Sewer Extension Phase 2

Phase one engineering for the extension of water & sewer services to the Route 47/176 corridor was completed in 2016.

The Village is funding Phase 2 which will extend water services to Ballard and Route 47. Phase 2 completion is expected by end of 2025.

The Village continues to pursue all funding possibilities from grants to development partnerships for Phase 3, full water & sewer extension.

# Police Adding a Tesla to their Fleet of Patrol Cars

The Police Department is continually in search of common-sense cost saving options.

This year the Board approved adding one Tesla Model Y Long Range to the fleet of Police patrol vehicles.

- Introduction of one electric vehicle allows cost savings without requiring vehicle charging schedules
- Vehicle will be used for 12-hour day shift and charged overnight at Public Works
- Electric services at the Public Works building are provided by ComEd at no charge
- The Tesla battery comes with an 8-year warranty, car will be replaced before end of warranty
- Municipal tax-exempt agencies are eligible for \$7,500.00 elective pay credit from the IRS
- After \$7,500.00 credit, charging station purchase/installation, vehicle emergency light installation the first-year savings estimated at \$6,000.00 with subsequent yearly savings of \$8,300.00

# I. Organizational Focus

The Crystal Lake Public Library has served the community since Nov. 15, 1913. The library began with a collection of books and magazines in the vacant H. A. Dodge home on Pomeroy Avenue. As demand for services grew, the library was moved to larger spaces over several decades. In 1952, a small stand-alone library was built at its current site at 126 W. Paddock Street. Eventually, the small building was leveled, and a larger facility was constructed in 1965. Two building additions/expansions followed, one in 1984 and another in 1995.

Crystal Lake Public Library is guided by the following mission statement: "We help people, of all ages and backgrounds, learn, enjoy and better their lives."

# Crystal Lake Public Library: Serving the Community for 111 Years!

After more than a century of service to the community, Crystal Lake Public Library remains committed to providing enrichment, education and entertainment to its patrons.

Most people visit the library for its extensive collection of books, audiobooks, video games, movies, music, TV shows, digital collection and learning resources.

Others stop by to apply for a U.S. passport, get a notary, use the copier machine, ask a reference question, attend a story time, or meet up with friends. Some borrow Wi-Fi hotspots, seek help in using their electronic devices, or research topics using the extensive database of resources.

Library staff routinely go out into the community to bring the library's resources directly to residents, such as those living in adult living

communities, or residents who are homebound. Youth staffers regularly visit area schools to promote reading and the library's offerings.

# CLPL Opens New Seed Library & Serves as Early Voting Site

# Seed Library

Crystal Lake Public Library launched a new Seed Library in early July 2024, thanks in part to a donation from the Crystal Lake Library Foundation.

Á Seed Library allows people of all gardening levels, from aspiring to masters, to try their hand at growing something new. The seed catalog is located in Adult Services in the library's upper level.

Patrons can browse through the ever-changing selection of seeds, take what they like, plant and watch them grow. If they choose, patrons can return seeds from their harvest at the season's end to help replenish the library's seed supply.

Crystal Lake residents can take 10 seed packets per visit and are limited to no more than two packets of each variety. The seed packets are free and are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

The Seed Library promotes seed diversity, community engagement in gardening and sustainability by encouraging the saving and sharing of seeds by local gardeners.

# **Early Voting Site**

For the first time in many years, Crystal Lake Public Library served as an early voting site for the November 2024 election. Residents expressed great appreciation for having a local early polling location.

The library's door count increased 256 percent over 2023 from Oct. 21 to Nov 4. Data shows 18,294 people visited the library this year during the three-week period to vote and use the library's resources. Staff also fielded 10,572 telephone calls from residents during this time, many of those questions relating to voting hours, etc.



# **MCC** HIGHLIGHTS

### INNOVATIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

- Opened the Foglia Center for Advanced Technology and Innovation (CATI). This state-of-the-art educational space supports advanced technology and manufacturing programs including HVAC, precision machining, welding, and more.
- Expanded opportunities for students to earn a bachelor's or advanced degree close to home through the new University Center at MCC in downtown Woodstock. Students can choose programs from Aurora University, Northern Illinois University, Southern Illinois University–Carbondale, or Roosevelt University.
- Unveiled the new Catalyst Campus in Woodstock.
  The facility is home to the recently renamed Career
  Spark Center, Talent Impact Center, Community
  Enrichment Center, and Small Business Development
  Center.
- Partnered with the Griffin Museum of Science and Industry. Located within our new Foglia CATI building, Griffin MSI@MCC brings advanced-level makers spaces and equipment, programming, and events to our community.

### **ENROLLMENT**

- Increased overall enrollment. Headcount increased by 0.82% from Spring 2023 to Spring 2024 and 6.54% from Fall 2023 to Fall 2024.
- Saw steady enrollment in dual credit programs. Dual credit classes allow high school students to earn both high school and college credit, saving them time and money. Dual credit headcount has increased 103% since Fall 2019.
- Celebrated several cohorts of graduates from our Dual Degree program. 27 students from Woodstock D200 and 9 from Harvard Community Unit School District 50 graduated with both their high school diploma and an associate degree in Spring 2024. Huntley High School also celebrated their first cohort of 18 students graduating from the program.

# **STUDENT SUPPORT**

- Provided a wide variety of resources to help students stay in school, including \$3,750 in MCC Café cards for those facing food insecurity; \$605 in Café vouchers for students needing intermittent food assistance; \$2,750 in gas cards to help with transportation to school; and \$1,650 in textbook assistance. The College's Center for Agrarian Learning also provided \$255 worth of vouchers for fresh produce for students in need.
- Facilitated 3,858 rides to campus through a partnership with MCRide from January–October 2024.
- Awarded more than 900 scholarships providing over \$760,900 in assistance to MCC students. The Friends of MCC Foundation also supported students experiencing unexpected financial emergencies, awarding more than \$21,800 through the Student Success Fund.
- Expanded mental health support. MCC offers oncampus counseling, online therapy through BetterMynd, and peer-to-peer support via Togetherall. The College also hired a dedicated wellness coordinator and offers regular mental health training opportunities for faculty and staff.
- Launched a health and wellness fair. The event connected students to a variety of resources, including local nonprofits and health-related businesses to help them live a well-rounded lifestyle.

# **PROGRAMMING**

- Expanded and optimized academic programs and classes. Added degrees in areas such as HVAC and Automation, Robotics, and Mechatronics, as well as a variety of certificates. The College also reviewed and enhanced curriculum for several career and technical education programs.
- Brought adult education classes into the community.

  Approximately 60 people enrolled in the initial class of on-site English as a Second Language (ESL) classes at the Amazon fulfillment center in Huntley.
- Achieved success across MCC Scots Athletics
   programs. In 2024, the Athletics program had 28 ISCC
   All-Conference honorees, seven All-Region 4 honorees,
   and two ISCC Players of the Year. The Baseball and
   Women's Tennis teams won the ISCC and Region 4
   championships. Academically, the program met their 3.0
   GPA goal and had 28 students earn NJCAA Academic
   All-American status.
- Celebrated students studying abroad. Nine students studied abroad in locations such as England, Ireland, Spain, Austria, and Costa Rica in 2024.

# MCC HIGHLIGHTS (CONTINUED)

### **COMMUNITY**

- Introduced a series of innovative programming through the Liebman Institute for Science Innovation (LISI). The community is invited to attend immersive seminars, listen to world-class speakers, and view the museum-quality Hall of Human Origins exhibit.
- Hosted our second Community Block Party. The
  event, which took place at Sew Hop'd Brewery in
  Huntley, featured family-friendly entertainment, live
  music, food trucks, and opportunities for MCC alumni
  to connect.
- Connected more than 100 high school students with summer manufacturing internships. In partnership with the Manufacturing Pathways Consortium, the internships allowed students to experience a variety of high-skilled career opportunities at local manufacturers.
- Expanded community enrichment programs. The
  Kids and College summer program now offers yearround opportunities, including a series of classes
  for Spring Break and hands-on courses in the Griffin
  MSI@MCC maker space. MCC also added new
  personal development courses, including community
  connection classes offered in partnership with a variety
  of local businesses.
- Welcomed hundreds of community members to campus. Our LISI events, concert series, plays, planetarium shows, art galleries, People in Need Forum, academic competitions, and more invited people from across the area to connect, discover, engage, and learn on MCC's campus.
- Organized the first Great Seed Event. Hundreds of attendees were able to pick up a variety of plant seeds, attend demonstrations, and learn about garden resources.

**Expanded Health Career Programs** 

### **GRANTS**

### Awarded nearly \$5 million in grants, including:

- \$2,633,192 from the Illinois Community College Board, including more than \$718,000 to support Adult Education, providing high-quality instruction, wraparound support, and services to help students transition to further education and careers. MCC also received \$173,050 to support education in the trades (construction, manufacturing, and healthcare), \$149,000 to strengthen dual credit education, and \$90,000 to incorporate electric/hybrid vehicle training in the automotive program.
- \$50,000 from the Illinois Board of Higher Education to help offset the cost of work-based learning opportunities, making paid internships for 31 students possible at small businesses throughout the county.
- \$35,000 from the Motorola Solutions Foundation to provide scholarships to students in first responder/ public safety fields (criminal justice, emergency medical services, and fire science).

# Supporting our community through grant-funded programs:

- No-cost counseling for more than 250 business owners through the Small Business Development Center (SBDC).
- More than 60 first-generation and low-income students at Harvard High School received support through the Upward Bound program, increasing their likelihood of successfully graduating from college.
- MCC's Library updated their archives through improved storage and new rotating displays, increasing public accessibility and promoting events for the community to connect over our shared history.





# **STUDENTS GAIN CAREER EXPERIENCE THROUGH MICRO INTERNSHIPS**

The Micro Internship class offers students an opportunity to learn about future careers through hands-on experience. The district has partnered with over 80 businesses to place students in a variety of internships including health, business, culinary, education, and trades careers. For the first time, the Micro Internship class was offered during the summer and 30 students completed the course. These experiences provide invaluable opportunities in fields students want to pursue in the future.

# **NEW COURSES ENGAGE** STUDENTS WITH REAL-WORLD **MATH CONCEPTS**

District 155 offered two new math classes during the 2023-24 school year. Geometry in Construction integrates real-life geometry concepts into construction projects, while Amped Algebra combines algebra with manufacturing processes, entrepreneurship, and design. Both courses build proficiency in math concepts and provide practical, real-world applications. Students taking Geometry in Construction earn a geometry credit and an industrial tech credit, while those in Amped Algebra earn an algebra credit and a business credit.







# **D155 CUTS OPERATING COSTS** AND IMPROVES SUSTAINABILITY WITH SOLAR PROJECT

The largest roof-mounted solar system in the greater Crystal Lake area is now helping to power Prairie Ridge High School. The solar project cuts overall operating costs, reduces the district's carbon footprint, and improves sustainability.

D155 is expected to receive \$1.3 million in total rebates and tax incentives for the solar project. The total cost to the school district is expected to be approximately \$200,000 once all incentives and rebates are factored in.





The D155 Board of Education approved a budget of \$6,300,000 to complete 10 essential capital improvement projects across the district.



District 47 partnered with Bricks of Hope for a charitable LEGO® Drive to support children during hospital stays. Families and students donated over 175 new LEGO® sets at collection sites throughout the district.

# **Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting**



District 47 received a Certificate of Excellence (COE) in Financial Reporting for its 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) by the Association of School Business Officials (ASBO), marking the 37th consecutive year the district has achieved this recognition. ASBO International

recognizes school districts that have met the program's high standards for financial reporting and transparency.


# **Security Upgrades**

# **Crystal Lake Elementary District 47 Board of Education**


The Board of Education is the legal governing body of the district and consists of seven elected members serving a typical term of four years without compensation.
